Dolly Parton Imagination Library

A child is 90% more likely to remain a poor reader at the end of fourth grade if they are a poor reader at the end of the first grade. By providing the resources a child needs to get ahead at a young age, United Way is able to level the playing field for children in the community.

We administer the Dolly Parton Imagination Library for 3,680 local children. A brand new, age – appropriate book is mailed to children every month from birth through five years of age, creating a home library of up to 60 books and instilling a love of books and reading from an early age. A gift of only S25 sponsors a child for one year.

Building Pathways Out Of Poverty

United Way plays a critical role in our community by filling gaps in services. We address basic needs first, such as hunger and homelessness, and then collaborate with partners to identify long term solutions.

United Way Backpack Program

One in five children struggle with food insecurity in our community. The United Way Backpack Program began in 2013 to address weekend hunger. Children were feeling sick and dizzy on Monday mornings. They were having a difficult time concentrating. We now coordinate businesses and groups to sponsor the weekend cost of groceries for 1700 children at S8,000. Volunteers pack and deliver nearly 1700 backpacks of food to local schools so that we end weekend hunger for children in need.

Center for Opportunity

Without another emergency shelter in our region, United Way raised funds to build a permanent shelter in our capital city for men, women, and families. The shelter was open 24/7 saving lives during the deadly winter temperature drops of -65 and connecting people to services.

More than 35 agencies offer regular onsite services to help clients out of homelessness.


